








What is America's Biggest Threat: Russia Or China?

Assessing the bigger threat to the United States between Russia and China is a complex and subjective matter. Both countries pose significant challenges, but the nature of their threats differs in several ways. Russia remains a formidable challenge to the United States in several areas. Russia is a nuclear-armed nation and a major geopolitical player. Russia possesses a significant nuclear arsenal, making it one of the few countries capable of causing catastrophic damage. It also possesses a significant military capability. Russia has demonstrated sophisticated cyber capabilities and has been accused of state-sponsored cyberattacks, including interference in foreign elections and infrastructure hacking. Russia's annexation of Crimea in 2014 and its ongoing involvement in the conflict in Ukraine have raised concerns about its intentions in the region. It often promotes a conservative approach to governance, emphasizing traditional values and state sovereignty. China's political interests blend Marxist-Leninist ideology with market-oriented economic reforms. The Chinese Communist Party maintains a dominant role in the country's political system and seeks to maintain social stability and economic growth.

Russia often challenges the existing international order, viewing it as dominated by Western powers and seeking to assert its own influence. It frequently opposes Western interventions and supports non-interventionist principles in international affairs. China seeks to reform and adjust global governance institutions to accommodate its interests and perspectives, while promoting a multipolar world order and the principle of non-interference.

Russia's political interests often revolve around its regional influence and maintaining a sphere of influence in its neighboring countries. It seeks to safeguard its borders, maintain stability in its periphery, and assert itself as a major player in global affairs. Russia also often forms alliances and partnerships with countries that share its geopolitical concerns or oppose perceived Western dominance. It has developed close ties with countries like Belarus, Syria, and Iran, and maintains strategic partnerships with some emerging powers. Whereas, China's political interests are more global in nature. While it also seeks to protect its territorial integrity, its primary focus is on expanding its influence beyond its immediate neighborhood. China is actively involved in shaping the international order, establishing economic ties, and pursuing strategic partnerships worldwide. China pursues partnerships and alliances based on its economic and strategic interests. It seeks to enhance cooperation with countries that can contribute to its economic development and provide access to resources and markets. China has established the Belt and Road Initiative to promote connectivity and economic integration with partner countries.

Russia's economic interests are closely tied to its energy resources and export-dependent economy. It seeks to protect its energy markets, secure favorable trade agreements, and diversify its economy away from dependence on oil and gas. China's political interests are centered around its economic development and the pursuit of economic prosperity. It focuses on expanding its market access, securing resources and supply chains, and fostering innovation and technological advancement.

In conclusion, while both China and Russia pose significant challenges to the United States, it is important to assess which country presents the greater threat. What is America's Biggest Threat, Russia or China? Why?

America's biggest threat is China. The 2022 National Defense Strategy identifies both China and Russia as threats to our National Security for different reasons. China to undermine our alliances and security partnerships in that region and Russia's record of aggression. China surpasses Russia as America's biggest threat due to population, technology and military prowess.

Russia is weak from their war with Ukraine. I think the world expected Russia to attack Ukraine and the conflict to be an easy win for them. This has been far from the case. Ukraine has held their own against Russia. National news estimates Russia has lost around 100,000 men to the conflict. Meanwhile, a simple Google search ranks China number 1 in military strength with about 4 million. As a comparison, the US military strength is about 2.1 million and Russian numbers are around 3.5 million which was estimated before the losses in the conflict. While military strength isn't enough to provide a good assessment, there is something to be said about military experience, raw numbers of people who can fight and superpower status in the world. China's goal is to be the only superpower and is reaching towards that goal in totality which technology is a big factor.

China has spent about 66 billion dollars in research and development in recent years. They are working on new aircraft carriers, 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> generation fighters (which rely heavily on technology) and they work with private technology firms. They are wiggling their way into American culture by tracking our social media usage via TikTok which will help them to control software and public narratives. We will likely never see conventional warfare such as what we experienced in the Great Wars, Vietnam, Korea or Desert Storm, Afghanistan anymore. Wars will be fought through artificial intelligence, attacking power grids, shutting down the vital networks we rely on to survive. China's continued increase in technological advances will place themselves in a position to be leaps and bounds above the world if we are not careful and do not keep up with their continued progression in these areas. China's military progress is also cause for concern.

As mentioned, they are utilizing their research and development teams for new equipment and technologies. They are looking at Taiwan for a strategic advantage. While they annoyed Europe with the Ukraine War, they are perfectly content with pushing the envelope. China may be in decline as they are the biggest importer of food and things needed to grow food. They are looking for way to ease their burdens. Through the Ukraine war, Russia was proven they are incompetent in military strategies. Their complete supply system broke down very early in their conflict rendering them hopeless. Meanwhile China is learning from this and testing the limits on advanced weapons systems and response times.

Secretary of Defense, Lloyd Austin in a press brief said "China has the intent and power to do it." While this differs from what Geopolitician Perter Zeihan feels (Podcast interview with Jack Carr). I feel China's motivation to survive and absolute goal to be the world's only superpower is enough. China does have it's downfalls. President Xi Jinping is the sole power in the country. There are no advisors to question his tactics or challenge his thinking which makes the country weaker, they still have strong research and development going on. China is proud of their genocides which alienates the world, however, their population appears to be loyal. Maybe it's loyalty out of fear, but they still have the raw numbers to overwhelm other militaries. China also as depressed birth rates despite the repeal of the One Child Policy. Russia

and the United States also have depressed birth rates. While Russia is a bit upside down (an older population vs a balance of young and old) the United States appears to be more balanced. Russia can't sustain a long conflict. They are barely surviving the Ukraine conflict. While this conflict is still Russia's to "win", regardless of the outcome, it's bound to leave them weak and the time it takes them to rebuild far outweighs them being a bigger threat over China.

Should the United States be complacent, China will use their technological advances and sheer strength in numbers to infiltrate the American way of life and next thing we know our technology will be compromised and we will be in a position where we can't defend ourselves. Good thing we have super smart think tanks and senior leaders at the highest levels who are aware of our vulnerably and can mitigate anything China can throw at us.

I believe that China poses a bigger threat to the United States and its citizen's security than Russia. Russia has a history of undermining American elections and has a stronger military, but that military has been exposed heavily throughout the war with Ukraine, and we now know how to combat some of Russia's deviousness. When it comes to China, there are many other reasons why they are threats to the United States. There are several recent accounts of espionage in China. Their economy is also the second biggest in the world, just behind America, with China being where a lot of products sold in the United States come from.

China poses a threat to the individual citizens of the United States with their espionage. For about a week from late January-early February, a Chinese spy balloon flew across the entire span of the United States collecting data. The United States government did not shoot down the balloon due to the threat of it falling on citizens. This scared the citizens of the United States because of the threat of information being stolen and falling into the hands of the Chinese Government, which has a history of data stealing. Over the past few years, news of the Chinese company TikTok stealing people's information from all over the world has been verified, and combined with the "surveillance balloon" flying over the United States, many American citizens reignited concerns about their data security. People are scared their information will get stolen by a country with a deep history of espionage and stealing information. A few states have joined multiple universities across the country that have started to ban the use of TikTok on their WIFI because of the security threat it poses. These states and universities are taking active steps to try and protect their users' data. I hope the government takes additional steps to protect Americans from what the Chinese government might try to do with open access to American citizens' data.

China also has the economic power and leverage to completely undermine our entire country's supply chain. So much of what we stock on our shelves come from China that they could simply just not sell any goods to us, and our entire country would have to find other means for food and products. We saw some of this during COVID when many store shelves were empty, and many electronic devices were unavailable due to not being produced in China or shipped from China as quickly as we needed them. In the last decade, China's economy has more than doubled to make up almost a fifth of the global GDP. While Russia has a GDP similar to that of Italy, China's economy is vastly growing and might soon overtake the United States for the top spot in the world. That is something that I think poses more of a threat to the United States than the military of Russia which gets so much praise yet has struggled mightily to take down Ukraine.

The United States has the military to confidently take on any country in the world, so while a rogue leader with nukes might be scary, in my opinion, an economy that has the power to undermine the United States and overtake them for the top spot scares me more. I definitely believe that China poses a higher threat to the United States than Russia does.

What is America's Biggest Threat: Russia or China?

America's biggest threat is Russia. The reason that I feel Russia is our biggest threat is based on current aggressive military activity, their threat of cyber-attacks, and nuclear arms. In addition to their willingness to challenge National order. Assessing Russia's current military activity in comparison to China, Russia is actively using their power to attack a neighboring country to strip them of their power and take over their territory. China may have a large military presence, but they are not currently using miliary force. Russia has shown aggressive behavior in their move into Ukraine and threats against other countries who come to the aid of Ukraine. NATO is a group that defends other countries, this means that if Russia starts attacking any other country, for instance Poland or Finland as they are right next to Russia, this will cause NATO and the US to come to the defense of these countries and pull the US into a war with Russia. Russia's leader, Putin, does not operate by the rules of international order. For instance, in 2014 Vladimir Putin said that he wanted to create a new world order that is "more friendly to Russian interests". As a result, he increased and modernized the Russian military to be able to support his ideals.

Russia also poses threats that are or could be directed at the US like cyber-attacks that attack our political system. Russian cyber-attacks are aimed to spread misinformation in a continual attempt to affect the US democratic system. For example, the US Senate select committee on intelligence determined that Russia had interfered with the 2016 presidential election by manipulating the voting machines and the processing of the polls. They hacked voting machine companies, and slowed disinformation and discord through social media channels. In 2017 American Civilian Agencies were told to remove Kaspersky Lab anti-virus software from networks because of concern that Russian intelligence agencies could use it to spy on the US government. In addition, they had sanctions put in place to interfere with the 2020 presidential election. That same year there was also an incident where the US government suffered multiple data breaches due to Russia hacking of Solar Winds software. It has also been revealed that hackers working for the Russian foreign intelligence service were exploiting 5 vulnerabilities to attack US companies and the defense-industrial base.

Another threat to the US is caused by Russia Nuclear arms since Russia possesses 45% of the international nuclear stockpile and the delivery systems that would allow it to target US soil. They are also developing 2 new nuclear capabilities, 1 being a hypersonic glide missile making it harder to detect, and a nuclear armed undersea torpedo, as well as growing its stockpile of tactical nuclear weapons. There is also a US Nuclear Posture Review that says "Russia considers the US and NATO to be principal threats to its contemporary geopolitical ambitions. Russian Strategy and doctrine emphasize the potential coercive and military uses of nuclear weapons." This shows that a nuclear strike from Russia however unlikely cannot be ruled out.

In conclusion, I feel past actions by Russia, in addition to their leader, aggressive military, continued threats for cyber-attacks and the risk for nuclear war makes Russia our primary threat.
